Are you thinking in mosaic?

Earlier this month, our mosaic tutor, Catherine Conaty, hosted a special event at Brisbane Square Library to celebrate the release of a new book on mosaics.

Entitled 'Mosaicism - Thinking in Mosaic', the book is the brainchild of leading contemporary artist and mosaic specialist, Dr Helen Bodycomb.

Helen Bodycomb is recognised as one of Australia's leading contemporary mosaic artists and is the only person in Australia with a PhD in Mosaic.

In *Mosaicism*, Dr Bodycomb draws upon her vast experience as a visual artist and her ground-breaking research to explain the human urge to 'make special'.

She explains that the intuitive act of assembling small, like parts, is one where the act of making is as important as the finished artefact.

Using imagery, prose, theoretical commentary, poetry and historical analysis, *Mosaicism— Thinking in Mosaic* explores the act of making as a way of thinking, through the embedded memories that all materials contain.

Laundry tub splashback in search of a theme



Brisbane Ekka brings out the best



Guild members have excelled with winning exhibits in this year's Brisbane Royal Show.

Congratulations to Warren Collins, who picked up first and third prizes in the Stained Glass category, and to Catherine Conaty, who achieved third prize in the Mosaics category.

In the Creative Arts and Craft section, Warren exhibited two leadlight panels with traditional glass painting, while Catherine exhibited a mosaic squirrel made from pieces of mirror contrasted against a black background.

There are six categories where glass artists are eligible to participate: Leadlight, Copper Foiling, Glass Mosaic, Fused Glass and Slumping, Glass Tile Work and Stained Glass – all of which were well represented with exhibits from people around the State.

Since here at the Glass Guild we have members who work in all the categories on display at the Ekka, wouldn't it be great if next year we could have more members enter their work into the competition?

It's a terrific opportunity to show what is possible with glass to the rest of Queensland. With daily attendances above 30,000 people, perhaps we can inspire others to get involved in the wonderful world of glass. Who knows, you might be successful and even win a place in the competition!

Of course, the interpretation for this theme can be vast, and limited only by your imagination.

Be inspired by diversity

Whether inspiration comes from our diverse geography with beautiful beaches, lush rainforests, vibrant cities and expansive outback plains, or from our cultural heritage, cuisine, architecture or lifestyle... the exhibition is sure to feature entries as diverse as the State itself.

Entries should be 25cm square, with a maximum 2 entries per person. \$10 boards can be purchased from Catherine Conaty. Closing date for entries is Monday 2nd October, and the exhibition will be held from Friday 17th November to Sunday 10th December 2023.



Members' pieces will be on display at this year's Glass Guild Showcase, then transported by Catherine to Maryborough. The Official Opening and Awards Presentation will take place at 12 noon on Saturday 18th November at Gatakers Artspace, 311 Kent Street Maryborough QLD.

This lady has a secret past


A lady with an interesting history will feature in this year's Creative Glass Showcase.

A leadlight now being completed by our leadlighting tutor, Jenny Keys, was cut out by one of her students about 10 years ago.

Jenny explains: "The student had just begun the leading stage, then disappeared, so it has sat in a cupboard for about 10 years. I have leaded it and finished it for the Guild so it's ready to display."

Known as the 'Lady in the Bath', Jenny has completed leading,

blackening, polishing and adding clear, iridised bath bubbles to the piece, ready for the 'Lady' to be sold in a silent auction at the October Glass Showcase to raise funds for the Guild.



Venice Glass Museum sparkles

One of the highlights on my trip to Venice in May this year was a visit to the Museo del Vetro (Venice Glass Museum) located on the island of Murano in the Venetian Lagoon.

The museum, which explores the history and craft of Venetian glassmaking from the 15th century to the present, was originally a patrician's palace in typical flamboyant Gothic style.



The ceiling of the large central room on the first floor testifies to the original splendour of the palace, with an 18th century fresco and three large glass chandeliers. The central chandelier, with 60 branches, was exhibited at the first Murano Glass Exposition in 1864, where it was awarded a gold medal.

Unique Exhibition

From 7 September 2023 to 6 January 2024, the museum will be hosting a unique exhibition that will break new ground by presenting around 40 pieces produced by Murano master glassmakers using

recycled industrial glass. The aim is to raise public awareness about recycling, sustainability and a more mindful use of raw materials, proving that even waste glass can be used to make magnificent works of art.

The exhibition, called *Murano: Upcycling Glass*, is one of the initi-

atives organized for Venice Glass Week 2023, an international festival that has been taking place in the city since 2017. The exhibition is supporting the *Sea the Change* project, which seeks to protect the lagoon ecosystem of the City of Canals.

Featuring the mosaic works of Catherine Conaty, Tani Bates, Margaret Shaw and Yvonne Ragonesi, *Nature's Diversity in Mosaics* is being held at the Crows Nest Gallery up until Sunday 15th October.

All hands make lamp work

Fancy making a beautiful copperfoiled lamp?

Why not sign up for one of Jenny Keys' panel lamp courses scheduled for next year?

Perhaps you can capture the clean lines and simple beauty of Japanese artistry by making the traditional Andon (pronounced ahn-dohn) lamp?

Andon lamps are ancient Japanese lanterns traditionally made from timber frames and paper (washi) screens.

Glass replaces paper

But for a special effect, stained glass panels can be used in place of paper to create a stunning display.

Andon lamps can be any style and any size with any finish, depending on the imagination and decorating tastes of the maker.

Pictured (top right) is a simple frame with a copperfoiled wisteria glass pattern, and (below right) a more complex Andon frame featuring thin Kumiko latticework patterns.
