Showcase 2024—a success story

Another successful Showcase was organised in November, a little later in the year than usual, but timely to benefit from Christmas shopping.

This was reflected in near-record sales of 990 items produced by Guild members. Over the weekend, we welcomed 680 visitors through the doors at Mt Coot-tha, 50 fewer than last year, but we nevertheless sold 400 more items than in 2023.

All up, we collected \$26,600 in takings, as well as taking in \$8,000 for course bookings over the three weeks after the event. The Showcase was never designed to be a big money-spinner for the Guild, as our profit after outgoings was around \$2,000.

We had higher expenses this year due to the construction of a number of new display stands, courtesy of member Ken Ede.

All in all, the Showcase was judged to be an excellent promotional activity to take the Guild's name, products and reputation to the wider community.
